Have you ever tried to explain the real meaning of Christmas to a child? 2 Corinthians 8:9 will, "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich."

The ABCs of Christmas

A — He Was Rich

God tells us the gold is mine and the silver is mine and whatever the father has the son has! That's the A of the ABCs of Christmas — He Was Rich.


B — He Became Poor

He was rich in eternity. He became poor in nativity. We understand riches and we understand poverty. But to choose to become poor is beyond us and something we would never intentionally do. But that is the heart of the gospel. The richest person in the universe, of his own free will, intentionally became poorer than the poor. He said the foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests but the Son of man has nowhere to lay his head.

C — That We Might Become Rich

James 2:5, Listen, my beloved brethren: did not God choose the poor of this world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom which He promised to those who love Him?

Here is the purpose of Christmas. Spurgeon commented that a rich man on earth has a cistern full of riches, but a poor saint has a fountain of mercy ever flowing for him. Let that saint draw as much water as he wants, for the fountain will never run out. Spurgeon then remarks, "He is richest who has a fountain." A cistern will be empty eventually, but the fountain of mercy flows forever. So I am richer than I think, and so are you when you have faith in the ABCs of Christmas!





What if we put our phones to work for God? Historically, cell phones have been seen as the Bible killer. They distract their owner from reading the Bible or doing other, more important, things. But how can we as Christians take something that is the source of such distraction and make it be used for good? The answer is easy, look at what distracts you the most and reverse the cycle.

For me, the number one distraction my phone has is an app called YouTube. It's a video sharing website where people can post videos for others to enjoy. About a year ago, my grandmother and I started to post a weekly video to the YouTube. Each week we play a fun little game and then my grandmother tells a story. She talks about her years working in Christian ministry, about her trips to Israel and the late-night visits to a mission downtown. She reminds them about relevant historic events that have significance to the coming week and she'll even tell an embarrassing story if I catch her on a good day. No matter what she talks about, though, she always manages to make the story swing back to the Lord. Week after week for almost a year, my poufy haired grandma and I have directly spoken to our hundred or so followers making them smile and reminding them God is always there. These are people from all over the world. Illinois, California, Minnesota, and we even have a weekly viewer in Germany.

I never really thought much about what we do until one day I found myself sitting across from one of my former teachers. Her husband was with her and when she got up to grab something to drink, he motioned for me to come closer and whispered in my ear. He told me about how she had recently started at a new school and that the transition had been exceptionally difficult. He spoke about her many sleepless and highly emotional nights in the past year, but he also told me there was a light in her darkness. Then he stopped to hold back his tears. He informed me that her one escape, the only time she would smile, was when she would take a break and watch one of our videos. He recalled many instances where he would get up to get her a glass of water because she was so emotional, just to come back to find her with a smile; all because of a simple three-minute video.

I don't tell you this to brag but rather to show you just how big of an impact three minutes can make. Everyone has their own struggles and darkness, but it's our job as Christians to be the shining light. So, next time you find yourself wasting countless hours talking on the phone or updating Facebook, try to take a portion of that time and put your phone to work for God.

Gospel Connection

When Jesus was talking to a man named Nicodemus, Jesus said, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:16). What did Jesus mean when He said this?

The Bible says that all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God. All of us have failed to keep God's commands and are therefore guilty of sin. Because God is just, He must punish sin. This means that all of us are deserving of punishment.

However, as Jesus said to Nicodemus, "God so loved the world." God, motivated by His great love for us, "gave His only begotten Son." Jesus is *the Son*. Jesus came to earth and was crucified and died to pay for our sins. After He died, He was buried. On the third day, Jesus rose from the dead. Jesus' death on the cross is the only acceptable payment for sin. In Jesus, God has provided a way for us to be forgiven and free from the punishment we deserve for our sins.

How is this payment for our sins applied to us? It is applied through faith in Jesus. Jesus said to Nicodemus, "Whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life." Turn from your sin and turn to Jesus. No matter what you have done, Jesus wants to forgive you today.


